Technology tips for parents

Apps for kids - do YOUR homework

More than 80,000 apps are labeled as educational, but little research has demonstrated their actual quality. Products pitched as "interactive" should require more than "pushing and swiping." Look to organizations like Common Sense Media for reviews about age-appropriate apps, games and programs to guide you in making the best choices for your children.

It's OK for your pre-teen to be online

Online relationships are now part of normal development. Social media can support pre-teens as they explore and discover more about themselves and their place in the grown-up world. Just be sure your pre-teen is behaving appropriately in both the real and online worlds. Many children need to be reminded that a platform's privacy settings do not make things actually "private" and that images, thoughts, and behaviors they share online will instantly become a part of their digital footprint indefinitely. Keep lines of communication open and let them know you're there if they have questions or concerns.

Take Home Readers

Take home readers for our children in F-3 have again been prepared for those families requiring extra readers. Each zip lock bag contains 10 books from the same level ie: Level A, B, C, D, E, F, G, or H as well as chapter books. Online Subscriptions:

At St. Mary's we have many online subscriptions to support our students in the area of Literacy and Numeracy.

Literacy

Sunshine Online which is a wonderful website containing hundreds of levelled texts. Children can log in and read along to stories and then complete associated interactive games and activities.

Sunshine Classics is another digital literacy program with over 300 E- books and 1000 interactive language activities to enjoy.

Foundation children are supported by the <u>Phonics Hero</u> subscription with individualised codes with the focus on phonics, reading and spelling online interactive games. Our Year 1 children have individualised log in codes for <u>Reading Eggs</u>. *All individualised passwords have been sent home*

Numeracy:

Yr 1's have access to <u>Mathseeds</u>. Mathseeds supports students aged 3-9 in core maths and problem solving skills with fun online maths games and activities.

The Year 2-6 students have individualised logins for <u>Mathletics</u>. Students have access to relevant content set by their teachers that will reinforce their learning and challenge them to go to the next level.

Supporting Reading At Home

Reading a book at home

When listening to your child read at home, here are a few points to consider:

- If possible let your child choose the place for reading.
 Successful reading can happen on the floor, out the back, and in the cubby house!
- Encourage your child to hold the book so he or she becomes familiar with handling it (turning the pages, etc)
- The books being read at home can/should be read more than once as the repetition helps support the child's fluency and comprehension of his/her reading.
- The books can have a different focus for each reading ie: Rereading for accuracy, fluency, comprehension,
 understanding of the storyline as well as for
 appreciation and enjoyment

Keeping children engaged

Because some reading practice is better than no reading practice - you may like to use one of the following strategies:

- Use a timer so that your child understands the reading practice will be for a short time.
- Read the book aloud to your child.
- Read the book aloud to your child but have your child read words that you know he/she can already read.
- Have your child point to the words while you read the words aloud.
- Read the book aloud together.
- Read half the book each.
- Put a sticky note a few pages ahead and tell your child they just need to read to the sticky note.
- Say, "I'll read it to you and then you can read it to me."
- Take it in turns to each read a page.
- When reading a story book, try changing the names of characters to your family's names!

Book Orientation: Talking about the book before reading

- Before reading a new book, talk about the title, and 'walk' through the book looking at the pictures and then predict what the story might be about.
- Discuss how to pronounce the names of characters and places in the book.
- If your child has already read the book, you may like to just ask what happened in the story? How did the story end?

The 3Ps: Pause, Prompt, Praise

<u>Pause—</u> Always allow time for your child to work out an unfamiliar/tricky word themselves, or at least give it a go (about 10 sec).

Prompt— Give a helpful prompt, for example:

"What would make sense here?" "Have another go."

"Can the picture help you?" "Can you see how the word starts?"

"Does that sound right?" "Read to the end of the sentence. Any idea what the word might be?"

......after two prompts JUST TELL THEM THE WORD

Praise— Always focus on what the child does well.

If your child makes a mistake, corrects it and keeps going...

 Praise AT THE END OF THE READING. Eg. "You went back and read that part again, that was great!"

If your child comes to a tricky word and pauses...

 Wait, Wait, Wait.... Ask some prompting questions suggested above.

If your child makes a mistake that makes sense...

• Let it go, then come back to it at the end and, repeat what they said and ask them to have another go.

If your child makes a mistake that does not make sense....

• Say the error back to them, does that make sense?

Talking about the book after reading.

- Can you remember the title?
- Were your predictions about the story correct?
- If there was a problem in the story, was it solved?
- What was your favourite part of the story?
- If you could change one thing in the story, what would it be?
- Can you retell the story in order?
- Which character would you like to be? Why?

Health reminder

A reminder that, in order to do our best to protect our community from contracting any virus, it is important to ensure that any unwell staff and students remain at home. If a child presents to the office expressing that they are unwell, or if their teacher feels that a child is displaying unwell symptoms, parents/carers will be called to collect them from school. It is important that in this current climate we are vigilant with the health of the community and take measures to make good decisions.

Absences during remote learning

Just a reminder that during remote learning, you still need to inform the office via PAM, phone or email if your child will not be in attendance on a particular day. This applies to both onsite students and remote learning students.

PAM User Guides

PAM – How can I notify the school of my child's absence via PAM?

By now you will have verified your email address and set up your child's medical profile. You can now begin to use PAM (Parent Access Module) as part of your communication with our school office. PAM is our preferred notification method for absences.

On PAM, you can add an absence if;

- Your child is going to be absent for the day (All Day)
- Your child is going to be late to school (Arriving Late)
- Your child is going to be leaving early from school (Leaving Early)
- Your child will be leaving school and returning eg. for an appointment (Partial)
- Your child is going to be absent for more than one day (Multi-day max of 7 days)

Absences must be entered prior to 9.25am on the day your child will be absent. Absences can also be entered in advance.

To add an absence;

Log in to your PAM account http://pam.smswanhill.catholic.edu.au

Save this link to your home screen for quick access

- Select "Parent Notified Absences" listed under "Students". This can also be accessed by selecting the 3 line menu bar on the top right hand corner of the screen and selecting "Parent Notified Absence".
- Select "Add Absence"
- Select the child who will be absent
- Select the reason for your child's absence
- Select the appropriate absence period
- Select the absence date
- Notes can be added if required
- You can edit or delete current and future absences, by clicking on your child and amending it if required.
